

Voting in Massachusetts

To vote in the Nov. 2024 election in MA, if you are not already registered to vote, you must be registered by Oct. 26th

Am I eligible to vote?

- You must be a U.S. citizen and at least 18 years old to vote.
- In Massachusetts, a person who has been convicted of a felony is eligible to vote after they have been released from prison.

Am I registered to vote?

- In order to vote in an election, you must be registered to vote.
- To check your Massachusetts voter registration status, visit www.sec.state.ma.us/voterregistrationsearch.

I didn't find my voter registration info on that website - How do I register to vote?

• To register to vote in Massachusetts, visit www.sec.state.ma.us/ovr, and click the button "Register or Pre-Register to Vote."

What if I don't want my address listed in my voter registration record, due to safety concerns?

Can I vote by mail?

- In Massachusetts, anyone who is registered to vote may vote by mail.
- To request a mail-in ballot, visit
 <u>www.sec.state.ma.us/divisions/elections/voting-information/vote-by-mail.htm</u>, and click the button "Apply Online."

I prefer to vote in person. Where is my polling place?

What if I've moved?

- Whenever you move to a new address in Massachusetts, update your voter registration information with your new address - visit www.sec.state.ma.us/ovr, and click the button "Update Address and/or Party."
- For state-wide elections, you can vote at the polling place where you lived as of January 1st of that year; you should still update your voter registration information with your new address whenever you move.

My voter registration record says "Inactive" - Now what?

- If your voter registration record says "Inactive," you can still vote, but it's a good idea to fill out a new voter registration record at www.sec.state.ma.us/ovr.
- Voters listed as "Inactive" will be asked for ID when they vote; if they miss two federal elections in a row (elections in November of even-numbered years), they will be removed from the list of registered voters, and will not be able to vote until after they register to vote again.
- Note: If you don't respond to your city/town's "Annual Street List" mailing, you will be put on the inactive voter list even if you vote in every election.
